### Voices from the Past: Life with Animals on the Prairie By: DDMF Researcher Pat Schley

Some of the best anecdotes in the letters which bring life on the Illinois prairie alive are those involving animals. Here are several of my favorites:

On the home front, Sarah Davis' first hired girl, who claims to be 5ft. 10 in. tall, proves to have a large personality as well: "Mary is quite fearless -...She often says the cow wants to "horn" her -but she is not afraid. She called me out to the stable yard to point out some new thing she had discovered in "Suke"(for so all cows are called here) and to show how smart she was. She attempted to take the calf from the cow [and] in so doing caught it by the forelegs -causing the little thing to make music. Old Suke was furious, and rushed to the combat much to my horror. I was standing near Mary, and when I saw the horned head -I screamed to M. to let the calf go. She held on till she saw I was frightened nearly out of my wits -and then I made for the house."

- Bloomington IL, May 3, 1840 (LL2) Sarah Walker Davis to Daniel Rogers Williams

By the end of the month, Sarah had resolved to let Mary go:

"I have resolved to part with Mary as soon as I am quite strong [she had just 2 weeks before given birth to their 1st child, a son, who was stillborn-ps] for she has deceived me in so many little things that I am disgusted with her-I can get along with any thing[sic] better than deceit..."

- Bloomington, May 31, 1840 Sarah Walker Davis to William Perrin Walker

1852 had brought a rainy spring for the lawyers on the circuit, when David Davis wrote to Sarah: "It rained a great deal –some very bad places in the road –but we got to Marion [Illinois] by dark -& I had a comfortable bed & good supper. Started next morning in the rain to the Sangamon river [sic] which is a mile from Monticello. Could not cross for 1 hour staid [stayed-ps] in rain, waiting for Ferryman = swam the horses –took the buggy over straddle [across] a canoe –and we went over ourselves very comfortably in the Canoe ="

- Urbana IL, May 7, 1852 (ALPL) David Davis to Sarah Walker Davis

"It rained very hard yesterday morning =... I hope it is dry with you, dearest-...I think of you, always, when it thunders, knowing your uneasiness about it-It seems that we cant [sic] ride anywhere, without its raining ~ I dont like to ride, (when it thunders & lightnens [sic]) in the open prairie-Pete [his horse-ps] got hurt in the stable at Danville, and is pretty much under the weather-I think he will get along but he was very much hurt -The confounded ostler [one who takes care of horses & mules-ps] ought to be whipped-However I have taken it pretty coolly- "

### Seed Saving for Sarah's Garden Future By Ellen Culver, Master Gardener

Sarah's Garden volunteers collect seeds from many of the annuals and perennials in the historic 1872 garden to hold in the Off-Site Reserve and to package for sale in the Clover Lawn Gift Shop. Most popular in the gift shop are California poppy, larkspur, zinnias and poppies, all amazing summer bloomers.

2023 was a unique year for seed production for the Dutchman's Pipe (Aristolochia macrophylla), a Sarah's Garden "original" growing up a trellis along the veranda on the east side of the mansion, as it has through history. Following the prolific spring 2023 bloom of little "pipes", Sarah's Garden volunteers carefully tied sheer fabric bags around dozens of the 2" long green seed pods. The bags protected those seed pods until the ripe seeds were harvested in the late fall. Preserving seeds in the Off-Site Reserve will guarantee future Dutchman 's Pipe plants on the east veranda if the original plant ever fails.

This past fall, Sarah's Garden volunteers refrigerated the harvested seeds, an important process before seed starting. Dutchman's Pipe seeds take their sweet time to germinate. With spring comes word that several seedlings have emerged and for the first time in many years, we may have new pants for the Off-Site Reserve.

Starting mid-April, stop by Sarah's Garden early Tuesday through Friday mornings when volunteers are working to enjoy the gorgeous blooms. At the end of a mansion tour, during a mansion event or through arrangement with the visitor center, shop the Clover Lawn Gift Shop for seeds, art, note cards, and other garden-related wares. If you haven't been to the **Clover Lawn Museum Shop** lately, you should stop by and see our new merchandise!

### A Research Update From DDMF Researcher Pat Schley

Hello, Foundation Members! I felt that a report about the transcription project was long overdue.

It was a different sort of year. Since 2013, I had been working on transcribing the Davis family letters in chronological order and then submitting them to Meg Miner, University Archivist and Special Collections Librarian at Illinois Wesleyan University, so she could put them online. The total number of transcriptions online as of this update was 1,376 online transcriptions, spanning the period from 1800 to 1886. Not all of the letters for all of those years are online, although all of the letters are online from 1800-1865.

Last year, I took a hiatus from the chronological editing to work on a group of letters that I had obtained from Duke University. They hold the Adeline Burr Davis Green papers, 1796-1956. I was able to obtain letters spanning much of the 19th century, plus her biography, which was a master's thesis written by Jane Stroud Mellon in 1959. It was the basis for my requests for material from Duke. They are very generous and allow other archives and institutions of learning (I am happy to say that they consider us to be one) up to 50 pages of scanning at no cost each year. I far exceeded the 50-page limit but their cost was very reasonable, plus the people that I have worked with there are very interested and enthusiastic about our online project. I was able to transcribe a group of letters written by Sarah Davis' brother-in-law, Daniel Rogers Williams, who accompanied the Judge and his new wife, Addie Burr, on their wedding trip from about April to June 1883 (they were married on March 14, 1883, in Fayetteville NC). Daniel Williams had made a similar trip to California in 1865, so he acted as a sort of guide and as a companion for Addie when she went out to explore the sites when the Judge was busy. Mr. Williams' letters were written to his wife, Fanny Walker Williams, Sarah Davis' younger sister. They lived in Stockbridge MA. Those letters are all online now for everyone to enjoy.

After those letters were finished, I was able to obtain Addie Burr Davis' "List of Companies Attended and Given - Since Coming to Bloomington - June 1883". It is a small, plain notebook with lined pages which appears to have been a gift to Addie from Sallie Davis for her 1st Christmas in Bloomington according to a small note contained in the book. (It was not in Addie's handwriting, so it may be a much later addition.) It is a veritable Who's Who of Bloomington society from June 1883 until about 2 months before the Judge's death on June 26, 1886. It is also online, if you are interested in seeing it. In order to make the transcription useful as well as readable, I made an index to try to help identify who the various people mentioned were. It was quite difficult in some cases because Addie, who was 1 year 8 months younger than her stepson, George Davis, bridged the generations socially. As a result, there were younger people invited who were often the now-adult children of the people of the Judge and Sarah's day. Many were named after their parents, so figuring out which person Addie was referring to was often difficult. As a result, a number of the IDs are "best guesses" at best. What I thought would be a fairly quick and easy transcription turned out to be exhausting! The 35-page notebook with its often faint, pencil-written entries, blossomed to 57 pages with the addition of the 22-page index.

It was now late May 2023 and I was somewhat burned out. During this same time, I had been helping author Raymond McKoski with an upcoming book, by proof-reading and editing two specific chapters. It was good timing because a lot of the editing was regarding the Judge's marriage to Addie Burr. One of the big changes was the retirement of Meg Miner, mentioned above, in July. Meg was instrumental in getting the transcription website up and running and, actually, for suggesting that we do it as a joint project back in 2012. She put each group of letters online and was a master at finding what teeny error was keeping them from uploading and correcting my errors. It was always done with grace and a sense of humor for which I was very grateful. At this point, it seemed a good idea to take some time off from transcribing over the summer until Meg's replacement had settled in and was ready to take this on.

I was so glad that it worked out for me to come back to Illinois to hear Edward Achorn give his talk about his latest book, The Lincoln Miracle, in October. I had had the opportunity to meet him and to take him through the mansion in 2011, when he was in town doing research on one of his baseball books. It was good to see him again and to see a lot of friends, too. While we were in town, I went to Illinois Wesleyan University to meet Meg Miner's replacement, Julie Wood. It was so good to be able to talk with her and to get to know her a bit. It is so nice to be able to picture the person I send the letters off to. They are working with JSTOR (an academic site which makes articles from many academic publications available online for student access) to feature some of the IWU collections online, and considering including some of the David and Sarah Davis Family Correspondence collection! That would make the transcriptions available on 2 different sites!

Julie is excited at the possibility, and so am I. I have used it many times in the last 20 years working on these letters. I will let you know if and when the collection is online there.

As of the 1st of the year 2024, I have been back at work on the chronological editing. My goal is to get all of the 1860s online and then really dig into transcribing the 1870s. Quite of few of the letters from 1868 are already online and there are fewer letters in the last few years of the decade, possibly thanks to the 1903 fire in the attic. There are some unexplained gaps in the correspondence and also many seriously scorched and damaged letters down in Springfield. We will never know how many letters were lost in that fire. I am grateful that as many of the damaged ones were kept instead of just being thrown away. As of the writing of this update, I just sent in the first 17 transcriptions for 1866. They should be online soon.








# A New Membership Brochure for a New Year

## An Artifact Returns Home



In mid-2023 the David Davis Mansion was contacted by a member of the Davis Family who had recently read our sesquicentennial book, The David Davis Mansion, 1872-2022: 150 Years at Clover Lawn. She was surprised to see that she was in possession of an artifact pictured in the background of one of the featured photographs. She graciously offered to return it to its home, and we were delighted!

The artifact finally arrived in December, after travelling for thousands of miles. In May we transported it to a conservator in St. Louis, MO who will be assessing it to see what is required to make it just as beautiful as it was when it first came to the mansion in the late 1800's. Once the artifact has undergone some cosmetic repair it will be returned to us, and we will spend some time conducting research on its provenance. We can't wait to share it with everyone later this year and present everything we've learned about this beautiful object to our visitors. It will then be placed on display in the mansion once again.
